Living next door to a crack dealer

DD Ruby had to step over the drug addicts outside her home. She talks to George Nott about how she's used these experiences in a novel

Γ'S not the ideal environment in which to write a novel. And an even worse place to live and raise a child. "There was constant noise, you're constantly being woken by bells ringing at all hours, or your own doorbell when it's not meant for you. You're living on small amounts of sleep and

under the constant threat of violence.

"People urinated in the corridor, you'd come across people using drugs strung out, and you'd find crack pipes in the corridor. It's very exhausting to deal with. Author DD Ruby (a

pseudonym used to protect her anonymity) suffered for years living next door to a crack house in Tottenham. While fighting for help from the local authorities, it was in these dire circumstances that the mother-of-two penned Block, her debut sci-fi crime novel.

"It was a long road to get results," she explains. "Sometimes it felt as if we were the criminals. Too long. A lot of it came from frustration.

The book is a gritty portrayal of a life lived in fear: protagonist Murella and long-term sidekick Cas must dodge the dealer on the doorstep to take the children to school too.

"We've had many books dealing with the idea of being an addict," says the 37-year-old, "and books about being a dealer, but not much about what it's like to be living in between, to be in a community

affected by this kind of activity.

"A lot of creative work almost glamorises this kind of world. There's nothing glamorous about it."

While Murella and Cas struggle to survive, two scientists and a politician believe they have found a solution.

The uncompromising Davenport is feeling frustrated by professional constraints, while Monroe, his downtrodden junior, is fast becoming bored of playing Robin to his Batman. When a self-serving individual with radical views on social reform steps in, things take an unexpected

This science element is drawn from the author's background in medicine, having graduated from medical school and worked as a health columnist.

"I've been around scientists for a large part of my life," she explains. "I became interested in the scientific mind, the characteristics, the common motivations. The competitive nature of research is really interesting – what drives the will to succeed and what happens when that supersedes everything else causing brilliance to spill over into corruption."

The ambitious book looks at power and the powerless, crime and

corruption, with elements drawn from superĥero comics - 'a story of dual identities where everyone's limits are being tested'.

"I don't want to say too much," says the author, "but let's say there's 'unlawful modification of individuals' that's going

It's an intriguing phrase that only reading the book can truly explain.

"There's an element of are we going too far, are scientists playing god? Sometimes when you change things there's no way of going back."

Although she won't go so far as saying the novel will leave readers feeling uplifted, the author, who now lives happily free from her former neighbours, says there are positives to take from it.

"I hope people will feel motivated to make a change. It's a story that needs to be told. It's not just my story but the story of many people who live in deprived areas. I hope I've given a voice to the

voiceless.

"You can endure, you can go on. You can exist and go on living, no matter what happens. You can come through to the end of something no matter how bad.
